THINGS TO BE AWARE OF

APA does not allow for footnotes. Thus, no footnotes should be used in your document.

APA also does allow for numbered or bulleted lists. However, it does supported seriated lists. These should appear as follows: (a) An item in the list, (b) Another list item, (c) A third list item, (d) The last list item.

FIGURES AND TABLES

Tables and figures should be prepared in accordance with the APA standards. The minimum acceptable font size for tables and figures is 8 point. This is the default in the L^AT_EX template and equivalent to `\footnotesize`.

Figures and Tables should be inserted within the text near where they are first mentioned or in a group at the end of the paper.

Large tables and figures that would not be readable if sized to fit a single column can be expanded in width to fit across both columns.

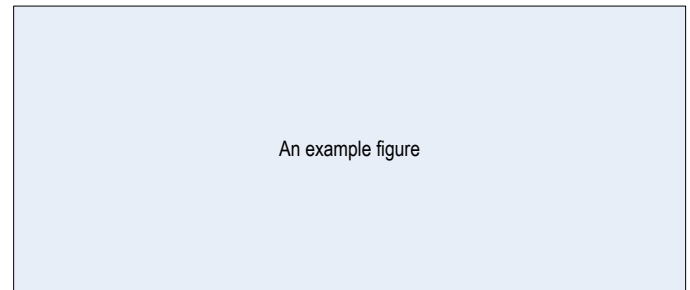


Figure 1. This is an example figure.

Figures and tables should be referenced in the text with “Figure” and “Table” respectively followed by their number. For example: see Figure 1 and Table 1.

EQUATIONS

An example equation is shown below:

$$x + y = z \quad (1)$$

Cross references to equations should spell out the word “Equation” like the following: see Equation (1).

CITATIONS

Note that the template automatically uses BibTeX with natbib and the APA parenthetical citation style. The cited references are all in refs.bib. It also supports the APAcite commands `\citeA` and `\citeNP`.

The `\citeNP` command is used when one is citing inside of parentheses: (an example of something can be found in Bolton, Zheng, Li, Edworthy, and Boyd 2019).
